We also learned how to talk about and demonstrate your language skills in a way that will appeal to federal employers, and our guests shared tips on how to prepare for a government career, search for jobs, and succeed in getting hired!

Mathilda Reckford: One of my favorite parts about this series was learning about the need for and use of different language varieties in the government. Our guests' use of language varieties and dialects help them in their job to bring more [01:30] understanding between people and strengthen relationships between cultures. In my personal journey of learning English as a heritage speaker, I worked on building my awareness of how the language is used in different settings, and the guests showed how valuable it is to make these efforts. It was interesting to hear the guests share that growing your heritage language into a profession is a fulfilling opportunity that many government jobs can provide.

Jamie: Yeah, I liked that part, too! I also liked learning about how many different jobs exist in the federal [02:00] government. I really appreciated hearing from a few different speakers that you may start off working in one area of the government, but over time will have opportunities to gain new skills and build a career that you might not have expected. Although I have not worked for the government, I personally pursued a job that was not directly related to my major in college and definitely recommend that job seekers keep an open mind about where they might end up in the future!

Francesca: I really liked the advice in our episode on "Networking and Searching for Government Jobs," especially that being proactive [02:30] in networking is really important and helpful to landing a job. Even though networking can seem awkward, it doesn't have to be formal and it can be done in many different ways, including through asking for informational interviews from people you meet or friends of friends who have experience in the government. An informational interview helped me get connected to the Center for Applied Linguistics for my first job after finishing graduate school.

Mathilda: We had fun and learned a lot hosting this podcast series and we want to thank our guests for providing their time and expertise. Across our [03:00] episodes, we interviewed 29 people, including 15 people who work for different agencies and organizations in the federal government. We were able to talk to speakers of Arabic, Chinese, Korean, Persian, and Russian who use their language skills in their jobs, as well as heritage language educators, specialists in language testing, and professionals who help connect students to careers.
