<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce only a few isolated words and/or practiced and memorized expressions - Can exchange greetings, give their identity, or name a few familiar objects when given adequate time and support. - Uses limited vocabulary and practiced and memorized language on very familiar topics. - Can communicate only with simple words and memorized expressions; language use beyond this may have errors and/or be unintelligible. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce a number of practiced or memorized words and/or phrases on very familiar topics. - Can provide information by responding to direct questions with a few words or memorized language. - Uses simple vocabulary and practiced and memorized language on very familiar and everyday topics. - Can communicate minimally; frequent pauses, searches for words, and use of native language are common. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce simple sentences most of the time, although these may be short and incomplete, or rely on memorized language. - Can request and provide information by responding to simple, direct questions or requests and asking a few formulaic questions. - Can express, ask about, and react to basic information and preferences on everyday topics. - Uses vocabulary related to familiar and everyday topics, including basic personal information, objects, and preferences. - Generally comprehensible when using memorized language, but breakdowns or errors may occur. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce simple sentences. - Can create with language in straightforward situations. - Can handle a few uncomplicated conversations and communicative tasks successfully. - Can express, ask about, and react with some details to preferences, feelings, or opinions on familiar topics. - Uses vocabulary for concrete exchanges related to familiar topics. - Generally comprehensible but speech may contain frequent repetition, rephrasing, or self-corrections; communication may not always be effective, and misunderstandings may occur. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce multiple sentences, including connected sentences. - Can create with language; may recombine known elements and conversational input. - Can handle a variety of uncomplicated conversations and communicative tasks successfully. - Can exchange information in conversation, and express preferences, feelings, or opinions on a variety of familiar topics. - Uses vocabulary for simple social and limited academic topics. - Generally comprehensible, although speech may contain pauses and repetitions. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce connected sentences that may form paragraphs. - Can narrate and describe in various time frames, but breakdowns may occur. - Can handle uncomplicated conversations and social situations with ease. - Can interact with others to meet needs, sometimes involving a complication; can explain preferences, feelings, or opinions on a variety of familiar and some concrete topics. - Uses a range of vocabulary for simple social and some academic topics but often lacks specificity. - Generally comprehensible, but breakdowns may occur when attempting higher-level tasks. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce a few simple paragraphs. - Can narrate and describe in major time frames with some control. - Can resolve an unexpected complication in familiar situations. - Can maintain discussions on a wide variety of familiar concrete topics including some academic topics. - Uses a range of vocabulary for a variety of social and academic topics but may lack specificity. - Comprehensible, but fluency of speech may be uneven. - Able to use strategies such as rephrasing and circumlocution. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce organized paragraphs. - Can narrate and describe in major time frames with good control. - Can resolve an unexpected complication in familiar situations with ease. - Can maintain discussions on a wide variety of familiar and unfamiliar concrete topics including some academic topics. - Uses a growing range of vocabulary for a wide variety of social and academic topics with emerging specificity in areas of particular interest or knowledge. - Easily comprehensible with fluency of speech. - Often uses strategies such as rephrasing and circumlocution. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can produce extended, organized, and detailed speech. - Can narrate and describe in detail fully and accurately in all time frames. - Can resolve an unexpected complication including in unfamiliar situations. - Can discuss and support opinions and advice on a variety of complex concrete topics, and sometimes address hypothetical or abstract issues. - Uses an extensive range of vocabulary to discuss a wide variety of social and academic topics, including some abstract topics, with precision. - Fully comprehensible with great fluency and ease of speech; some patterns of error may persist, but they do not interfere with communication. - Confidently uses strategies such as rephrasing and circumlocution.
